BE IT RESOLVED BY I MINA'TRENTAI SINGKO NA LIHESLATURAN

GUÅHAN:

WHEREAS, the Unrepresented Peoples and Nations Organization (UNPO) is an international membership-based organization established to empower the voices of unrepresented and marginalized peoples worldwide and to protect their fundamental human rights; and

WHEREAS, the UNPO was conceived of in the late 1980s by exiled leaders of people living under communist oppression, and

WHEREAS, The UNPO was formally founded in February 1991 at the Peace Palace in The Hague, by representatives of movements belonging to Australian Aboriginals, Armenia, Crimean Tatars, Cordillera, East Turkestan, Estonia, Georgia, the Greek Minority in Albania, Kurdistan, Latvia, Palau, Tibet, Taiwan, Tatarstan and West Papua. They were joined just a few months later by representatives from

Abkhazia, Aceh, Assyria, the Chittagong Hill Tracts, South Moluccas, Bougainville, 1 2 Chechnya, Kosova, Zanzibar, and the Mairi and Iraqi Turkmen people; and 3 WHEREAS, Since then, UNPO's membership has grown steadily from its 4 original founders, with membership from more than 45 peoples worldwide, comprising 5 over 300 million people lacking true representation in domestic or international forums; 6 7 and WHEREAS, Since its founding, many members have achieved their movement's 8 9 goals and found a formal seat for their people at the national or international level and have thus left the organization as their peoples are no longer considered to be 10 "unrepresented" – including the Republic of Palau; and 11 12 WHEREAS, the UNPO serves as a forum, and advocacy group for groups that 13 have been disenfranchised; and 14 15 WHEREAS, the UNPO membership, comprised of Indigenous Communities, 16 Occupied Territories, Unrecognized States, and Minorities, came together to protect the 17 equal right of all peoples to self-determination, adhere to internationally-accepted 18 human rights standards, adhere to the principles of democratic pluralism and rejection 19 of intolerance, promote non-violence and the rejection of terrorism and violence as 20 instruments of policy as well as the protection of the natural environment; and 21 22 WHEREAS, Guam is a territory of the United States, with no vote in Congress, 23 and her People have systematically been denied their right to vote for their President; 24

WHEREAS, since the beginning of the relationship with the United States, the 1 2 People of Guam have never been given the ability to voice their opinion, or make a 3 decision; and 4 5 WHEREAS, Guam, through its Legislature, based on the policies it has put forth, has upheld the principles of the UNPO covenant, this includes the equal right of all 6 peoples to self-determination, adherence to internationally-accepted human rights 7 standards, adherence to the principles of democratic pluralism and rejection of 8 intolerance, promoting non-violence and the rejection of terrorism and violence as 9 instruments of policy as well as the protection of the natural environment; and 10 11 WHEREAS, for over a decade, the People of Guam have appealed to the United 12 Nations to intervene and protect the fundamental rights of the People of Guam – to date 13 14 there has been no reprieve; and 15 WHEREAS, Guam is not the only place where the United States asserts its 16 dominance over a locality and prohibits their participation in the democratic process; 17 18 and WHEREAS, the District of Columbia is also a member of the UNPO, and 19 actively fighting for equal representation is the United States Congress as well; and 20 21 WHEREAS, Guam can additionally benefit from its membership to the UNPO 22 be having a seat on the international stage, and access to global bodies that are mandated 23 to defend our rights; now therefore, be it 24
